What we have been up to...

Holywell

In Holywell class our Foundation children have been busy in Maths learning more about recognising patterns of numbers without needing to count, as well as the composition of numbers. They have also been continuina to read and write new sounds and have started to work on blending sounds together to make words. In Year 1 our children have been comparing numbers, ordering objects and exploring the different parts of whole numbers. In Literacy, Year 1 have been thinking about using adjectives in our writing to describe woodland animals and linking our sentences together. For our topic in Holywell class we have all been looking at the parts of a flower and their functions, as well as being 'leaf detectives' to find out what types of trees we have on our school grounds.



<u>Fistral</u>

Super learning for the end of the term in Fistral.

A special visit from a Cornish Pirate helped us have fantastic focus and teamwork through interactive games.

We spoke to two professional people on Wednesday, asking questions on why they chose their careers as a paramedic and submarine engineer.

<u>Tolcarne</u>

Tolcarne have really enjoyed reading, A walk in London, and have now written an information text about their favourite landmark. We ended the topic by presenting to the class what we would do if we were the Queen or King for the day. We have started our Science about All Living Things, and we have been identifying and classifying what we have found around school into what is living, no longer living and never been alive. In Maths, Year 2 has been using number lines to place and estimate where numbers go. A big thank you for the projects that have started to come in - they are all amazing!



<u>Watergate</u>

Year 5 have had a brilliant fortnight, we have been focusing on adding, subtracting and using inverse to manipulate number. We have also written some fantastic "Percy Jackson" esk stories, which have some very dark monsters and fight scenes. The afternoons have been packed with harvest assembly, music and Science. I'm sure if you ask they will happily sing "Living on a prayer" or show you how to separate different materials.



<u>Porth</u>

Over the last few weeks Porth Class have been reading The First Drawing and building up to writing their own stories set in the Stone Age. As part of our learning, we took on the role of the characters and acted out a scene from the story and create freeze frames. In Science we have continued our learning about Animals, including humans and the class constructed human skeletons, learning the names of several bones.



<u>Crantock</u>

We have had a wonderful fortnight in the run up to half term! This week we celebrated the Harvest festival with a church service; the children loved singing the songs and listening to the gust speakers on the important job farmers have in Cornwall. In Literacy, we have moved on to developing skills through non fiction, based around the idea of the hidden underwater worlds that are around the world. The children have persevered with their Maths, particularly focusing on using written methods to solve 4 x 2 digit multiplications. Our geography work has centered around Iceland and particularly the small volcanic island of Hiemaey and how this compares with where we live, the children came up with the interesting ideas as to why not many trees grow there. Congratulations to all the children who took part in Bikeability too. I look forward to seeing you all over the next couple of days at parents evening!
