What we have been up to...

Holywell

Holywell class have been working hard on all of their learning over the last two weeks! Foundation have been busy learning to read and write their new sounds and working out what words start with these sounds. We've also been reading Oi Frog and talking about words that rhyme. In Maths they have been busy subitizing up to 4 (recognising an amount without needing to count), as well as practicing accuracy when counting. Our Year 1s have also been busy learning a new set of sounds as well as reading and writing about the book Mrs Mole I'm home. In Maths they have been focusing on counting on and back from a number, fewer, more, less and comparing groups. For our topic 'Wonderful Woodlands', both year groups have been learning about woodland animals, their habitats and what they eat.

<u>Tolcarne</u>

During the last two weeks we have been using maps to navigate around London using a compass to help us move in different directions. We then made some famous London landmarks that millions of people would have walked past in the queue to visit the Queen at Westminster Abby. We then recreated the queue ourselves walking along the river. We've also enjoyed our ICT time and have begun our online safety unit in Purple Mash. In Maths, Year 2 have been working hard to partition numbers to 100 different ways.



<u>Fistral</u>

We've had a busy few weeks in Year 4. We have been looking at why the battle at Senac Ridge played an important part in the future of Britain. We are now writing a newspaper report including many features we have learned about. In Literacy, we have been analysing newspaper reports-looking at 'Tabloids' and 'Broadsheets'. We enjoyed our session with Neil from the Cornish Pirates too.





<u>Watergate</u>

Year 5 have had a fun-filled fortnight. First of all, they were lucky enough to go to Fistral beach and build offshore windfarms with Atlas Professionals—This was amazing and nobody managed to stay dry! They then had a coding workshop delivered by Software Cornwall, they were shown how to use raspberry pi to code and make different designs. They've also been very busy doing their normal day-to -day learning, focusing on understanding number and they have started to write their own chapter for Percy Jackson and the Lightning Thief.



<u>Porth</u>

Porth Class have had a brilliant two weeks. We have been continuing our learning on the Stone Age in our Topic lessons, learning about how artefacts help us to understand how people in the different periods of the Stone Age lived. In our literacy lessons the children have written some brilliant instructions for how to wash a woolly mammoth. It has been fantastic to see the projects the children have been bringing in from home, we look forward to sharing them with you on October 12th!



<u>Crantock</u>

We are now halfway into the first half term of Year 6. In Literacy, the children have loved being creative and are producing some exciting Grimm tales based on stories that we have read. In Maths, we have moved on from place value and are now beginning to look at the four main operations. Our topic work has been heavily focused on science this week, where the children have enjoyed exploring evolution and inheritance and how fossils are a fantastic way of supporting this theory. Our Year 6s also took part in the macron football festival where the teamwork and togetherness was first class!
